Looking ahead: understanding future needs and conditions for volunteerism in disaster management and search and rescue

In Norway, various events are changing the landscape of emergency preparedness and response, including government reform, changes in how Norwegian volunteer, climate change and an aging population. These changes are affecting the need for and implementation of disaster management and search and rescue by the Red Cross and other expertise.

The Norwegian Institute for Social Research and NorCross have undertaken a research project to improve our understanding of future crisis scenarios, resource demands and preparedness needs within Norway. The views and experiences of various actors within the field of crisis and disaster management have been captured. This workshop will outline the research process and illustrate how the mixed methods approach was harnessed to gain a comprehensive understanding of the research problem.

What is The needs of future voluntary emergency response?

- Research collaboration over 2 years
- Purpose: strengthen the evidence basis for emergency response and preparedness
- Evaluates likely incidents and societal trends towards 2050 and their consequences for risks and emergency response organization
- Output:
 - Two scientific reports pages
 - Accessible «main findings and recommendations» report
 - Research article(s)

Research Design

- Register data, crisis scenarios, projections, foresight
- Combination of qualitative and quantitative data
 - Survey to all volunteers
 - Survey to local leaders (branch presidents and SAR unit heads)
 - Group interviews of Norwegian Red Cross stakeholders (both volunteers, district employees and national office)
 - Interviews of stakeholders within the county governors and the police
 - Collaboration project funded by the Norwegian Research Council: Interviews in six case municipalities spanning three police districts

Roles and collaboration

• ISF: assigned project manager and researchers

Red Cross:

- Cross-departmental reference group
- Regular orientations and consultations with RC national level governance bodies (SAR, Care, Youth)
- Day to day follow up from NorCross analysts

Key questions



How is the current situation with regards to preparedness and response capacity in voluntary emergency response in Norway?



How can we better prepare for the future given the challenges identified today?



How can societal trends affect local and national emergency response in the future?

Subreport 1 –

An analysis of the risk for serious incidents and crises

- Here we investigate the probability for and extent of emergency response in the future in Norway.
- We do this by combining register data on emergency response in Norway for the period 2010–2021 with projections of crisis scenarios, population growth and climate change.
- We also discuss how societal trends and development affect the extent of local emergency response and preparedness as well as the future role of voluntary actors in local emergency response and rescue work.




Subreport 2 –

Today and future preparedness and reponse capacity


- Here we look at how the trends in demand (from subreport 1) affect the supply-side (preparedness and response capacity) in Norway.
- We do this by combining cross-sectional interview and survey data with strategic foresight and existing literature in the field.
- Taken together, we analyze and discuss the needs of future local emergency response and preparedness as well as the future role of voluntary actors in local emergency response and rescue work.



What kind of knowledge did subreport 2 give us?



NorCross-Concluding Report

- Demographic change
- Urbanization
- **Communication** diversity of languages
- Climate change less predictable, more extreme weather
- Households
- Centralization of public services distances to rural communities
- Changes in volunteering preferences short term, practical engagement



Red Cross - conclusion

Agreement that the Norwegian cooperative model for emergency preparedness works. Volunteers play an important role locally. Looking ahead to 2050 however, we do face significant challenges:

- A significant increase in the number of unwanted incidents
- More unwanted incidents and emergencies which disproportionally affect vulnerable groups
- Lack of local government capacities and resources for preparedness work now and looking ahead
- Risk of decline in number of people willing and able to volunteer due to changes in volunteering preferences
- Exhaustion in preparedness, SAR and emergency volunteers' motivation and energy due to need for fund-raising
