Refugee Youth Volunteering Uganda

Project formed Youth Advisory Boards in each site and partnered with local and organisations, including the IFRC and Uganda Red Cross Society























Aim: Understand whether volunteering by refugee youth in Uganda helps their skills acquisition and employability and reduces the inequalities they experience

Key collaborative approach in a snapshot:

- **9** researchers across **4** universities (in Uganda and the UK) + respective professional services
- 10 stakeholder partners (in Uganda and beyond)
- **30** Youth Advisory Members in the 4 research sites (Bidibidi, Kampala, Nakivale and Rwamwanja)
- Over **3,800 participants**, including young and adult refugees, employers, government officials, and staff from humanitarian and development agencies and community-based organisations
- Mixed-methods approach, including participatory methodologies

What is photovoice and why have we used it?

Photovoice is defined as:

"A process by which people can identify, represent, and enhance their community through a specific photographic technique." (Wang & Burris, 1997, p.369)

Photovoice has been part of the mixed-methods approach of the RYVU research project aiming to:


- Allow participant-led identification of what is important and has meaning for them;
- Provide a way of documenting lived experience as it happens over time;
- Provide both data and resources for engagement, advocacy and learning.

Photographer Milka Nzambimana (Nakivale settlement) "Information is power."

"Many youth in our community normally come to this place to find adverts about different job and volunteering opportunities by different organisations and even the private sector in the notice boards."

Photographer Denilson Polepole (Kampala city) "Volunteering can take place anywhere."

"She is a family member... I went one day to visit her, and she was selling those bananas on the road. So, I really said, she's really volunteering on the road selling bananas..."

RYVU Innovative Approach through Interactive Games

- RYVU Photo Pairing Game: card matching game inviting players
 to engage with photos taken by young refugee volunteers and to
 try and pair them with the photographers' descriptions of the
 pictures, encouraging participants to consider different angles
 when interpreting refugee volunteering experiences.
- RYVU Volunteering Journey: role play game inviting players to step into the shoes of refugee volunteers and take on challenges and opportunities from different perspectives, opening up discussions on personal volunteering experiences and key concerns to take into account when engaging volunteers.
- RYVU Volunteering Diamond: ranking game inviting players to reflect on their own motivations to volunteer and how the meanings of volunteering can be perceived differently by others, allowing participants to discuss what impacts this might have on volunteering policy and practice.
